

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



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Puppets' Animation via Computer Programs

Dr. Ashraf Mahdy



The famous Opera Aida was chosen as a plot of the workshop for its variety of characters and its peculiarity since its events are taking place in the times of Ancient Egypt. The main theme of the opera is a love story between Aida, the girl with African origins and Radamès, the commander of the Egyptian troops.

Workshop consists of two parts:

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First: Ways of designing the characters and their preparation.

Second: Animation via computer programs. Workshop tries to show the way of puppets' animation using computer programs and its features as well as demonstrate merits and disadvantages of this method. The event is also aimed to encourage discussion among young artists about this way and possibilities of its development to foster the field of animation but primarily it focuses on showing different way of puppets animation



A Masterclass in scriptwriting **By Tsitsi Dangarembga**

Tsitsi Dangarembga is the director of Institute of Creative Arts for Progress in Africa (ICAPA) Trust (Incorporating Women Filmmakers of Zimbabwe and Nyerai Films) Founder of International Images Film Festival for Women (IIFF) now she is teaching creative writing, and African film and literature at Northwestern University, Chicago.

Masterclass aims:

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-that each applicant can create a short fiction film script that can serve as a fundraising draft
- Each applicant should have of a script in progress in very first draft stage, with the intention of the story and character descriptions.

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Workshop for principles of animated films for children

Each child will produce his own film using Stop Motion technique which is simply a way to use still images to produce a moving clip, in the same way as the





old animator who used to draw pictures of cartoon characters on multiple boards and then, by sequentially moving them, shows the viewer that these cartoon characters moving.

The young filmmaker will capture a series of images according to a planned scenario, and then he will use video montage programs to assemble and animate, then add the appropriate sounds to make this clip alive.

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




About the Chronicles of Egyptian Cinema By Aly Aboushady

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A book translated into French by Abla

The idea of the book when it was proposed in Paris to create a chronological show of the most important events in the history of cinema in Egypt since the first screening in Tosson Stock Exchange, Alexandria on November 1896 ,5 until 1995 as part of celebrations of the Arab Institute of the centenary of the first film screening in Egypt. It was agreed that the book has objective look at facts and events without critical comments following similar methods in the history of world cinema.

While embarking on the implementation, I faced many difficulties due to the scattering of information in dozens of sources, as well as opposing information in different sources and the absence of scientific references so it was necessary to work on researching using a scientific method ... and the book came in the end monitor and document the most important facts and events in the history of cinema in Egypt including films, theaters and directors, and prizes in order to offer a complete panorama about the most important happenings every year depending on cinematic centers and researches by professors who tried to document the information each in his/her fields.


The first edition that was published by the Supreme Council of Culture in 1997 was entitled Chronicles of the Egyptian Cinema in a Hundred Years from 1896 to 1995 was translated into English in 1999. The second edition was published by Damascus Film Festival in 2001 was entitled Chronicles of the Egyptian Cinema in a the 20th Century after adding the years 1996 to 2000, then was the third edition entitled Chronicles of Egyptian cinema 2002-1896, adding two more years and this is the edition which have been translated into French and published by the third edition of Luxor African Festival Cinema 2014

The book is a most important references for researchers and specialized professionals , critics and film lovers in Egypt and the Arab World and Africa.

The first part of this book traces the development of African cinema, from colonization to Afrocentrism, through themes such as the decolonization of the imagination and the quest for legendary African origins. The second part of the book analyzes specific films, particularly through narrative and in terms of their African specificity. Finally, the author explores the social and economic contexts of the African cinema and television industry.

Olivier Barlet

was born in Paris in 1952. He has translated a number of books on Africa and of African authors, and is also the author of different books himself. He is a member of the Syndicat français de la critique de cinéma and has been a film correspondent for Africa international, Afrique-Asie and Continental, and now for Afriscope and Africultures.

He is in charge of the Images plurielles collection on cinema for L'Harmattan Publishing House. His book entitled «Les Cinémas d'Afrique noire : le regard en question», which won the Prix Art et Essai 1997 from the Centre national de la Cinématographie, has been published in the collection and has been translated into English under the title «African Cinemas, Decolonizing the Gaze» (Zed Books, London, 2000), as well as into German and Italian. Olivier Barlet was 2004-1997 Chief Editor of Africultures, an African cultural journal that features a paper edition and a website (www. africultures.com) and is now in charge of the internet development.

He has also written numerous articles on African film for Africultures and in various journals, and is a member of the African Federation of film critics (www.africine.org) through the french Afrimages association. His Books include: Cinema of Black Africa, African Cinemas of the Years 2000.

ETISAL's mission is to provide to the needs of young African filmmakers in expressing freely their skills and talents through filmmaking and promote their work globally.

African short films is a "life savior" of young filmmakers (Aged between 30-18 of both genders) who are marginalized in terms of production and distribution. Although young filmmakers represent a significant potential for the future of the industry in the continent, funds are not available,

During its Second edition in 2013, LAFF organized pre-meetings for ETISAL with producers, filmmakers, festival directors, who recommended setting up a fund for the young African filmmakers, establishing an African Film Mart for promotion and distribution, using modern digital technology and setting up a data base and a digital library for African films.

ETISAL will assist a FUND of 40000 \$ to support production of 20 short films during 2014. To achieve the rest of the recommendations, ETISAL aims to establish partnerships with other African film festivals and also with distribution companies and TV channels. Therefore, by supporting production, promotion and distribution of African short films, ETISAL gives equal opportunities to young African filmmakers to promote cultural diversity and freedom of expression thoroughly.

LAFF will add a new program called Space to Establish Partnerships (STEP) This program is geared to shoulder young filmmakers from the African continent and from the Diaspora, in pre or post-production of their first or second long narrative. STEP will help to finance 5 selected projects.

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



Glover is well known for his roles as Mr. Albert Johnson in The Color Purple, as Michael Harrigan in Predator 2, as corrupt cop James McFee in Witness, as Detective Sergeant Roger Murtaugh in the Lethal Weapon film series (where he coined the catchphrase «Im too old for this shit»), as Detective David Tapp in Saw, and as George Knox in Angels in the Outfield. He has also appeared in many other movies, television shows, and theatrical productions. He is an active supporter of various humanitarian and political causes.

Glover was born in San Francisco. His parents, postal workers, were active in the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), working to advance equal rights.

He attended George Washington High School in San Francisco. He attended San Francisco State University (SFSU) in the late 1960s but did not graduate. SFSU later awarded him an honorary degree.

Glover was in a variety of film, stage, and television roles, and is best known for playing Los Angeles police Sergeant Roger Murtaugh in the Lethal Weapon series of action films.

He also starred as the husband to Whoopi Goldberg's character Celie in the celebrated literary adaptation The Color Purple, and as Lieutenant James McFee in the film Witness.

In 1994 he made his directorial debut with the Showtime channel short film Override. Also in 1994, Glover and actor Ben Guillory formed the Robey Theatre Company in Los Angeles, focusing on theatre by and about Black people. During his career, he has made several cameos, appearing, for example, in the Michael Jackson video Liberian Girl of 1987. Glover earned top billing for the first time in Predator 2, the sequel to the sci-fi action film Predator. That same year he starred in Charles Burnetts To Sleep with Anger, for which he won the Independent Spirit Award for Best Actor.

Activism

While attending San Francisco State University (SFSU), Glover was a member of the Black Students Union, which, along with the Third World Liberation Front and the American Federation of Teachers, collaborated in a five-month student-led strike to establish a Department of Black Studies. The strike was the longest student walkout in U.S. history. It helped create not only the first Department of Black Studies but also the first School of Ethnic Studies in the U.S.

Glovers long history of union activism includes support for numerous service unions and also in the environmental issues.

Danny Glover has been an outspoken critic of the Iraq War before the war began in March 2003.

Flora Gomes

A Bissau-Guinean film director, he was born in Cadique, Guinea-Bissau on 31 December, 1949 and after high school in Cuba, he decided to study film at the Instituto Cubano del Arte y la Industria Cinematográficos in Havana.

Shot fourteen years after independence, Gomesis Mortu Nega (Death Denied) (1988) was the first fiction film and the second feature film ever made in Guinea-Bissau. (The first feature film was N'tturudu by director Umban u'Kest in 1987) At FESPACO 1989, the film won the prestigious Oumarou Ganda Prize. In 1992, Gomes directed Udju Azul di Yonta, which was screened in the Un Certain Regard section at the 1992 Cannes Film Festival.

Son of illiterate parents, as a child Gomes struggled against the limitations of his social status and the oppression of the Portuguese colonial system under António Salazans rule. He supported Bissau-Guinean resistance against colonialism and greatly admired Amílcar Cabral. He left Guinea-Bissau to study cinema in Cuba (1972) at the Cuban Institute of Art and Cinematography, under the guidance of Santiago Álvarez. He continued his studies in Senegal, at the Senegalese Journal for Motion Picture News, under the direction of Paulin Soumanou Vieyra.

He also co-directed two films with Sergio Pina and worked as an assistant with Chris . Upon returning to liberated Guinea-Bissau, Gomes filmed his countrys independence ceremony (24 September 1974), fulfilling the desire of Amílcar Cabral that it should be Bissau-Guineans themselves capturing this historical moment on film. After freeing itself from colonial rule, Guinea-Bissau was visited by many reporters and progressive filmmakers and Gomes, given his knowledge of cinema, was in great demand to assist them, which allowed him to expand his skills Marker and Anita Fernandez



At the end of 1970s, he worked as a photographer and cameraman for the Ministry of Information.


Having first directed historical documentaries, Gomes filmed his first feature film, Mortu Nega, in 1987. Mortu Nega depicts the struggle for independence and the challenges of the first post-independence years in Guinea-Bissau. The film was screened at several international film festivals and Gomes caught the attention of commentators and critics. He was particularly well received in France, which in later years enabled him to attract funding for the production of new films. In 2000, he was distinguished in France with the title of Chevalier des Arts et des Lettres.







The film premiered at the Carthage Film Festival. In 1974, he directed his first full-length film in the Bambara language, Den muso (The Girl), the story of a young mute girl who has been raped. In 1978, Cissé directed Baara (Work), which received the Yenengas Talon prize at FESPACO in 1979. In 1982, he directed Finyé (Wind), which tells the story of Malian youth rising up against the establishment. This earned him his second Yenengas Talon, at 1983, s FESPACO. Between 1984 and 1987, he directed Yeelen (Light), a coming-of-age film which won the Jury Prize at the 1987 Cannes Film Festival. In 1995, he produced Waati (Time) which competed for the Palme d/Or at the 1995 Cannes Film Festival. Cissé is also president of UCECAO, the Union of Creators and Entrepreneurs of Cinema and Audiovisual Arts of Western Africa.


Elham Shaheen Actress Egypt
